Westward Expansion after the Civil War

Period 6 runs from 1865 to 1898 – the **Gilded Age** 镀金时代. Industry, migration, and the West transform the country, and every transformation produces a political argument about who benefits.

But the same forces squeezed farmers: **consolidation in agricultural markets** 农产品市场集中化 left them facing high freight rates, expensive credit, and falling crop prices.

The final dispossession of American Indians

the shift in policy	federal policy moved from treaties to reservations , and then to forced assimilation
the Dawes Act 道斯法案	1887: broke communal land into individual allotments and sold the surplus
boarding schools	children removed from families to be stripped of language and custom
what drove it	railroads, mining, cattle and farming all demanded the land
the buffalo	its near-extinction destroyed the economic basis of Plains life

The change from treaty-making to reservations is a change in **legal status**: from dealing with nations to administering wards. Say that and the analysis is made.

The Rise of Industrial Capitalism

The Rise of Industrial Capitalism

Large-scale industrial production, accompanied by massive technological change, produced enormous output and enormous firms.

- New **corporate structures** 公司组织形式 – trusts and holding companies – allowed **consolidation** 合并 and, in some industries, near-monopoly.
- New **transportation and communication** networks, above all the railroad, created a genuinely national market.
- Business leaders defended their position with **laissez-faire** 自由放任 arguments: competition promoted growth, and government should stay out.

The Rise of Industrial Capitalism, continued

The same period produced **rising inequality** 不平等加剧 and recurring financial panics, which is why the economy itself became the central political question.

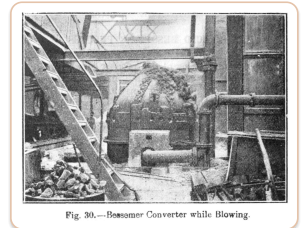


Fig. 30.—Bessemer Converter while Blowing.
a Bessemer converter blowing

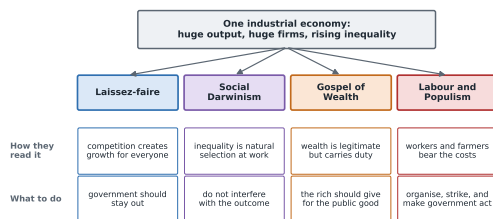

Strikes 罢工 were frequent, often large, and frequently broken by state or federal force, which itself became an argument about the role of government.

The Knights of Labor and the AFL

	KNIGHTS OF LABOR	AMERICAN FEDERATION OF LABOR
WHO IT ORGANISED	almost everyone who worked, skilled or not	skilled workers only, by craft
WHAT IT WANTED	a reformed society — an alternative to wage labour itself	better wages, hours and conditions inside the system
WHAT FOLLOWED	collapsed after being blamed for the violence at Haymarket	survived, and became the model for American unions

The narrower aim is the one that **survived**. “Workers organised” is not an answer on its own – the exam wants which kind of organising, and why it lasted

4 Migration and the Cities

Migration and the Cities

International and internal migration increased urban populations and fostered the growth of **cities** 城市.

New arrivals came increasingly from **southern and eastern Europe** 南欧与东欧, alongside Chinese migration to the West – which met the **Chinese Exclusion Act** 排华法案, the first significant federal restriction on immigration by nationality.

One arrival, two simultaneous responses



The machine and the nativist are responses to the **same** arrival, at the same time. Only one of them ends in a federal law

5 The New Middle Class and Reform

The New Middle Class and Reform

Corporations' need for **managers** 管理人员 and for male and female **clerical workers** 文职人员 expanded a new **middle class** 中产阶级, with new patterns of consumption and leisure.

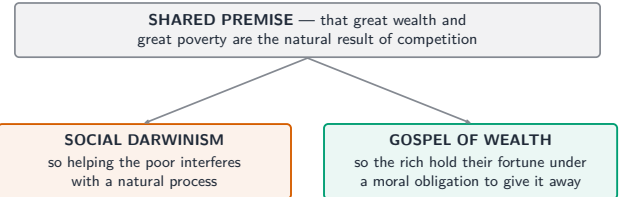
- **Social Darwinism** 社会达尔文主义 used evolutionary language to justify inequality as natural.
- The **Gospel of Wealth** 财富福音 argued that the wealthy had a **moral obligation** 道德义务 to use their fortunes for the public good.
- Agrarians, utopians, socialists, and artists criticised industrial society from the other direction.
- Many women sought greater equality, often through **voluntary organizations** 自愿团体 – temperance, settlement houses, and suffrage work.

The city, the machine, and the argument over citizenship

political machines 政治机器	in cities where access to power was unequally distributed, they provided jobs, housing help and services
the exchange	in return for votes – and with corruption alongside the real assistance
why they lasted	they did what no public institution yet did for new arrivals
cultural movements	both buttressed and challenged the social order – often the same movement doing each
the running argument	over citizenship 公民身份, race 种族 and the role of government
whose rights	the question of which groups the Reconstruction amendments actually protected was reopened repeatedly

Machines were corrupt and functional. Saying only the first misses why immigrants voted for them, which is what the question wants explained.

Social Darwinism and the Gospel of Wealth



Same premise, opposite **duty**. Neither one questions the inequality – which is why the reform movements had to come from somewhere else

Politics and the Populist Challenge

Politics and the Populist Challenge

The major parties appealed to lingering divisions from the Civil War and competed over **patronage** 政治分肥 more than policy, producing close elections and limited legislation.

Populism failed as a party but placed on the agenda the idea that government should intervene in the economy – the argument Period 7 takes up.

Organising against the new economy

Mechanization	Mechanization raised output and cut the skill a job needed – which is what made the worker replaceable.
American Federation of Labor	The American Federation of Labor organised skilled workers by craft, and bargained for wages and hours rather than for a new social order.
The Knights of Labor	Organised broadly – skilled and unskilled together – and declined after Haymarket.
The People's Party	The People's (Populist) Party was the farmers' answer: rail-road regulation, free silver, and a direct income tax.

Craft against industrial organising, and farmers against workers. Naming which body a demand came from is what separates a strong answer.

Industrialisation changed where people lived and what they did, while inequality, sectional political loyalties, and racial exclusion persisted.	Period 6: 1865-1898 Continuity and Change in Period 6 Worked example – naming who was affected differently 2025 long essay: “Evaluate the extent to which economic changes influenced United States society between 1865” and the end of the century. ■ Scoring: “Economic change reshaped American society to a great extent after 1865, creating an urban industrial working class and a salaried middle class, but its benefits were distributed so unevenly that farmers and industrial workers organised politically against it.” ■ Naming who was affected differently is what allows an argument about extent. “The economy grew” describes. “It grew, and here is who organised against how it grew” argues.
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Period 6: 1865-1898 Continuity and Change in Period 6 Exam tips ■ Explain farmers' anger with mechanisms: freight rates, credit, and falling crop prices – not “farmers struggled”. ■ Keep the four Gilded Age responses distinct: laissez-faire, Social Darwinism, the Gospel of Wealth, and organised labour and Populism. ■ For immigration, name the shift to southern and eastern Europe and the Chinese Exclusion Act as the first nationality-based federal restriction. ■ Political machines are examinable as both corruption and social provision. Saying both is what earns the complexity. ■ Populism matters less for winning than for putting government intervention on the agenda. ■ On continuity-and-change prompts, name a specific continuity.
