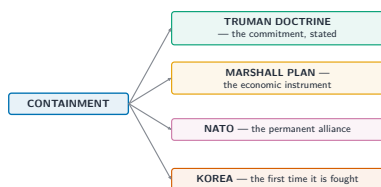
The Cold War, 1945 to 1980

Period 8 runs from 1945 to 1980. Two arguments dominate it: how far the United States should go to contain communism abroad, and how far the federal government should go to guarantee rights and welfare at home. They are connected, because both are arguments about the reach of national power.

American policy settled on **containment** 遏制 – preventing the spread of communism rather than attempting to remove it – expressed through the **Truman Doctrine** 杜鲁门主义, the **Marshall Plan** 马歇尔计划, and **NATO** 北约.

What containment committed the country to

the Korean War 朝鲜战争	a limited war fought under a UN mandate, and never formally ended
a permanent military	a standing peacetime establishment, unprecedented in American history
alliances	NATO and a network of treaties requiring a response anywhere
the arms race	nuclear stockpiles, and a doctrine of deterrence
unanticipated	these were commitments the country had not expected when containment was formulated

Containment was a strategy for Europe that was applied globally. The gap between the doctrine and its reach is the standard essay argument.

The Red Scare at Home

Fear of communism reshaped domestic politics. **Loyalty programmes** 忠诚审查, congressional investigations, and **McCarthyism** 麦卡锡主义 targeted suspected communists in government, universities, unions, and the entertainment industry.

The examinable point is the **cost to civil liberties** 公民自由的代价: accusation often functioned as proof, and the fear narrowed the range of acceptable political debate for a decade.

Prosperity and Its Discontents

The postwar economy grew strongly. Federal spending on defence, highways, and the **GI Bill** 退伍军人权利法 supported home ownership and higher education, and the population moved to the **suburbs** 郊区 and to the **Sun Belt** 阳光地带.

Culture changed with it: mass consumption, television, and a distinct **youth culture** 青年文化 with its own music and markets.

The boom, and who was outside it

THE BOOM

the **GI Bill** — education and mortgages
the **suburbs** and the **Sun Belt**
a youth culture with money of its own

AND WHO WAS OUTSIDE IT

poverty concentrated where
the boom did not reach
inner cities and rural regions left behind
benefits distributed unequally by race

The boom is the **context** for the 1960s, not a separate topic: the War on Poverty is aimed at the right-hand column

└ Prosperity and Its Discontents

Prosperity was uneven, and the movement broadened

suburban growth	frequently closed to African Americans by law and by practice – restrictive covenants and redlining
the cities	lost tax base and jobs as the middle class left
poverty	persisted through the boom, and was rediscovered politically in the 1960s
the movement expanded 扩展	later activists raised economic inequality, housing and policing, and some rejected nonviolence
the 1970s	inflation 通货膨胀, oil shocks and industrial decline ended the postwar boom

The civil rights movement's shift from legal segregation to economic and northern questions is what the period-8 comparison prompts usually turn on.

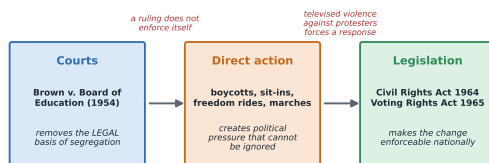

federal action consistently FOLLOWED the pressure rather than leading it

The Civil Rights Movement

Early steps in the 1940s and 1950s worked mainly through the **courts** 法院. Legal strategy produced **Brown v. Board of Education** 布朗诉教育委员会案, which held segregated schooling unconstitutional and stripped away the legal basis of segregation.

Court victories did not enforce themselves, so the movement turned to **direct action** 直接行动: the Montgomery bus boycott, sit-ins, freedom rides, and mass marches, organised through churches and student groups and grounded in **nonviolent protest** 非暴力抗议.

The Great Society and the Vietnam War

The **Great Society** 伟大社会 extended federal responsibility furthest since the New Deal: Medicare and Medicaid, federal aid to education, and the **War on Poverty** 向贫困宣战.

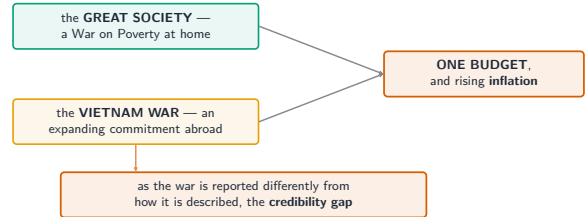
Defeat abroad and disillusion at home weakened confidence in federal power just as its domestic role peaked.

6 Society in Transition

Society in Transition

The later part of the period is defined by movements and by limits.

- The **women's movement** 妇女运动 pressed for legal equality and workplace access; the **Equal Rights Amendment** 平等权利修正案 failed ratification.
- **Environmental** 环境保护 concern grew into federal action on air, water, and endangered species between 1968 and 1980.
- **Immigration** law was reformed in 1965, changing the origins of new arrivals.
- **Conservatism** 保守主义 organised in response to all of it, on taxes, social change, and the size of government – the movement Period 9 opens with.

Three movements, and a race

- Black power** Black power argued for self-determination, community control and pride, where the earlier movement had argued for integration.
- The antiwar movement** The antiwar movement grew from campuses to the mainstream as the draft, the casualties and the credibility gap widened.
- The space race** The space race carried the Cold War into a contest of prestige – and paid for a generation of science education.
- What connects them** All three question who speaks for the nation, and on whose authority.

Continuity and change: the sixties movements inherit the fifties' methods and reject its patience.

Rights expanded enormously in law; economic inequality and residential segregation persisted, and both statements belong in a strong answer.	Period 8: 1945-1980 Continuity and Change in Period 8 Worked example – a contribution, with its limit 2023 long essay: “Evaluate the extent to which the growth of civil rights activism contributed to changes in government action” in the twentieth century. ■ Scoring: “Civil rights activism contributed to a great extent to changes in government action: litigation produced <i>Brown v. Board of Education</i>, and sustained direct action created the pressure behind the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 – although federal action followed rather than led it.” ■ The prompt asks about a contribution: activism is the cause, the government changes the effect. “Followed rather than led” is the qualification, and it is where the sophistication point lives.
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Period 8: 1945-1980 Continuity and Change in Period 8 Exam tips - Define containment precisely – preventing spread, not rollback – and use it to explain Korea and Vietnam as consequences. - For the Red Scare, the mark is in the cost to civil liberties, not in a narrative of accusations. - Present civil rights as courts → direct action → legislation, each stage creating the next. - Say what the Great Society actually did (Medicare, Medicaid, education aid) rather than calling it “reforms”. - Vietnam's domestic effect – division and the credibility gap – matters as much as the military outcome. - On continuity-and-change prompts, pair legal gains with persistent economic and residential inequality.	8 Recap
